- As a community voice, we stepped up in a challenging year to expand the security communications and preparedness resources made available to over 100 local Jewish organizations through the SAFE Washington program.
- The seven young Israeli emissaries we brought to the Puget Sound region did a world of good spreading appreciation for Israeli life and culture closer to home.
- The results of our investments in Jewish life strengthened its foundation: more children got a strong start on their Jewish journeys through the PJ Library[®], more Jewish organizations are growing endowments for the future, and more people found community at our Neighborhood Song and Story times, Pop-Up Shabbats, and holiday celebrations.

There are many inspiring stories to tell in the following pages. A thread running through them all is that the work of ensuring a vibrant, thriving Jewish community is made possible by your generous support of the Federation. 




Sharing stories is a time-honored way to build a vibrant, thriving Jewish community. The Jewish Federation of Greater Seattle's award-winning magazine, *Jewish In Seattle*, tells timely stories about our community that engage, inspire, and strengthen Jewish life.

The magazine, published bimonthly in partnership with SagaCity Media, is now in its third year of publication, and 15 published issues have been sent to over 4,300 households in greater Seattle. With sharp writing and imaginative artwork, *Jewish In Seattle* has attracted significant attention—engaging readers in thoughtful, provocative features exploring community issues, keeping us abreast of developments in the arts, health, and business worlds, and making plenty of space for the topic that has brought Jews together since time immemorial...food!

Jewish In Seattle continues to win awards by capturing the hearts and attention of Jews in the Puget Sound region. In 2017, the magazine was honored with three awards, from the American Jewish Press Association (AJPA) and Folio Magazine.

ADVOCACY

The Jewish Federation of Greater Seattle's advocacy ensures community values and priorities are represented and acted upon in our state capital.

Our advocacy and leadership for reducing gun violence was instrumental in the 2016 passage of the Extreme Risk Protection Order ballot measure. Following up, Federation support helped pass legislation to strengthen safeguards keeping firearms away from people already barred by law from owning them.

During the 2017 legislative session, the Federation advocated for securing budgets supporting critical human services programs. In addition to our advocacy efforts, we also hosted our fifth Legislative Seder, which educated lawmakers on Jewish values that are the foundation of our community's priorities. Furthermore, 65 community members attended Jewish Community Lobby Day to meet in person with their elected representatives, which was a 60 percent increase from 2016.





COMMUNITY VOICE

COMMUNITY CONVENING

Stepping up into its role as the community convener, in May 2017 the Jewish Federation of Greater Seattle brought together 50 community leaders from 24 Jewish organizations to identify and address our most pressing cross-communal challenges. To lead us in this work, the Federation retained Rabbi Doug Kahn, who served 27 years as the executive director of the Jewish Community Relations Council in San Francisco. Rabbi Kahn is highly regarded nationally for his leadership and consensus-building skills on contentious issues.

With the Federation and Rabbi Kahn leading, a subgroup of the initial 50 community leaders continued to meet to clarify issues of concern and identify solutions.

By working together, we can address challenges that no one organization has the capability to address alone. In this collaborative effort, we are building stronger communication, better cohesion, and a solid basis for understanding and civil discourse. We will continue meeting in 2018 in order to gain consensus on priorities and collaboratively address them.







SAFE WASHINGTON

Our state is safer because of the Federation-run SAFE Washington (SAFE WA) program. SAFE WA, a Mark Bloome initiative, offers participating organizations and cemeteries real-time information about potential dangers, and preparedness training and resources for human-caused and natural disasters. Over 100 Jewish organizations across Washington State have access to all levels of law enforcement through the SAFE WA security communications network.

Helping Jews Overseas

Strengthening connections to Israel and World Jewry by helping Jews in need and fostering global Jewish connections is one of the ways the Jewish Federation of Greater Seattle is building a vibrant, thriving community.

Since our earliest days, the Federation has made assisting Jews in need overseas a high priority. Through our longstanding partnerships with the Jewish Agency for Israel and the American Jewish Joint Distribution Committee, and through our direct investments, the Federation continues to help vulnerable Jews obtain food and healthcare, benefit from social services, and access education and Jewish identity programs.

Creating People-to-People Connections

The Jewish Federation of Greater Seattle is creating opportunities for Jews locally, in Israel, and abroad to get to know each other and strengthen connections in ways that only personal relationships can.

During spring 2017, the Federation was the proud community organizer of #NWIsraelFest, which celebrated Israeli culture, including innovation, art, music, and food, and commemorated Yom Ha'atzmaut, Yom Ha'zikaron and Yom Ha'shoah. In its second year, #NWIsraelFest is already a big success. The festival brought together 30 Jewish agencies to organize 25 collaborative events.

The Federation continues to sponsor extended visits by young Israeli emissaries who work at synagogues, day schools, and Jewish camps to infuse Israel into local Jewish life. We do this through the Shinshinim program, a partnership between the Federation, the Jewish Agency for Israel (JAFI), and our local Jewish organizations. The Summer Shlichim program, a partnership between the Federation, the Stroum Jewish Community Center, and JAFI, sponsored three Israeli emissaries this past summer.

We help Washington State teens connect with their Jewish identity through need-based, Israel Experience Teen Scholarships. In 2017, the Federation awarded scholarships totaling \$51,000 to 20 teens, an average of \$2,550 each. We also support Taglit-Birthright, which provides Jewish young adults the gift of a free 10-day trip to Israel.

SPECIAL PJ LIBRARY EVENTS HELD THROUGHOUT GREATER SEATTLE For parents raising Jewish children, PJ Library, a program of the Jewish Federation of Greater Seattle, is a valuable resource for integrating Judaism into family life and connecting with the Jewish community.

PJ Library is a success using two methods. Monthly mailed PJ Library books do a wonderful job telling stories that introduce children to Jewish holidays, traditions, history, and heroes. The Federation also offers PJ Library Neighborhood Song & Story times in convenient locations around the Puget Sound region. Through this combined approach, PJ Library strengthens our Jewish community.

Results of a recent Harold Grinspoon Foundation survey of PJ Library families across the U.S. and Canada, including the Puget Sound region, show families have embraced PJ as a parenting tool that enriches Jewish life in the home and inspires families to connect more closely with the Jewish community.





Jewish Overnight Camping

The Jewish overnight summer camp experience has proven benefits. Camp is an entry point for families otherwise unengaged in Jewish life, and families whose children have gone to camp are much more likely to take part in Jewish life throughout the year.

The Jewish Federation of Greater Seattle lowers barriers for families to send their children to camp through need-based scholarships as well as One Happy Camper incentive grants for children making their first trip to camp. By administering scholarships for local and regional camps—Camp Solomon Schechter, Sephardic Adventure Camp, and URJ Camp Kalsman—these camps have more resources to do what they do best—give children life-changing camp experiences.



Neighborhood Connections

The Jewish Federation of Greater Seattle makes investments in opening doors to Jewish life that meet people where they are and will ensure a strong community.

Pop-Up Shabbats and holiday celebrations are welcoming events where Jews can get to know their neighbors and create community at the neighborhood level. Through partnerships, the Federation is helping synagogues and organizations reach out to unaffiliated Jews. Partnering organizations on Pop-Up events include: Congregation Beth Shalom, Congregation Kol Ami, Kol HaNeshamah, Panim Hadashot, Secular Jewish Circle of Puget Sound, Temple Beth Am, Temple B'nai Torah, and Temple De Hirsch Sinai.

As a result of our Pop-Up Shabbat in Ballard, a new chavurah was formed to bring together individuals who want to continue engaging in Jewish life.

In addition to our successful Pop-Up events, the Federation's personal outreach program, "Newish and Jewish," connects new arrivals in Seattle with resources and programs that fit their interests.

We also provided \$200,000 for day school scholarships, enabling more children to attend local Jewish day school and experience the intellectual challenge of a Jewish education.



PAVE Seattle

The Jewish Federation of Greater Seattle's PAVE program collaborates with other Jewish organizations to create ways for Jews in their 30s and 40s to connect locally. PAVE events are welcoming, inclusive, and relevant to those new to the community as well as those looking for deeper involvement. In 2017 alone, PAVE event attendance totaled over 1,200.

We are offering high-impact, low-barrier, relevant on-ramps for people. Whether it is a one-on-one meeting welcoming a Seattle newcomer, hosting a holiday celebration with partner organizations, or going to a sports event, PAVE is the anchor that creates welcoming, inclusive, and fun opportunities that make people want more.

Advanced Leadership Development Program

Jewish organizations that provide important programs and services depend on a strong ladder of leaders-in-waiting in order to ensure continuity and growth in Jewish life. The Jewish Federation of Greater Seattle's Advanced Leadership Development Program (ALDP) prepares community members for positions of responsibility as members of committees and boards that lead Jewish organizations and shape their important work.

ALDP equips a select group of Jewish adults, typically in their 20s and 30s, with skills, knowledge, and community connections that are necessary for taking on communal leadership roles. The participants selected for the program engage in thoughtful discussions about community issues and the ongoing work of Jewish organizations.

The cohort will have opportunities to network with peers and to learn from some of the most experienced leaders, philanthropists, and educators in Jewish Puget Sound.

Thanks to ALDP, Jewish organizations have access to a pool of talented leaders ready to serve our community in the years ahead.



Cardozo Society

The Cardozo Society, sponsored by the Jewish Federation of Greater Seattle, is the Washington State Bar Association's minority bar for Jewish legal professionals. Cardozo strengthens relationships among attorneys, judges, and law students through engaging and topical programs, including mentorship opportunities, networking events, and Continuing Legal Education courses.

A highlight of 2017 was the honoring of Craig Sternberg with the Cardozo Society's annual L'Dor V'Dor Award for his service to the Jewish and legal communities. The Cardozo Society's Judicial Evaluation Committee published ratings for 22 judicial candidates in fiscal year 2017. These ratings are an effective way for the Cardozo Society to serve the Jewish community and to make a difference in the legal community.

Lion of Judah

Lions of Judah are Jewish women who have set an exemplary standard of philanthropic leadership through their extraordinary contributions to the Jewish community. The Jewish

Federation of Greater Seattle is grateful to Barrie Galanti for hosting the 2017 Pamela Waechter z"l Lion of Judah Luncheon, which featured guest speaker Winnie Sandler Grinspoon, President of the Harold Grinspoon Foundation . Winnie shared the impactful results of two programs on which the Federation and the Foundation partner—PJ Library[®], which gives families with young children an entry point into Jewish life through Jewish-themed children's books, and LIFE & LEGACY™, which is ensuring a healthy future for Jewish life through endowment building.



LIFE & LEGACY[™]

Ensuring a bright future for the Puget Sound Jewish community is the goal of the LIFE & LEGACY™ program, which the Jewish Federation of Greater Seattle carries out in partnership with the Harold Grinspoon Foundation. Through LIFE & LEGACY, the Federation is working with 13 local Jewish organizations (including the Federation itself) to provide tools, training, and incentives to build endowments via after-lifetime legacy giving.

In the period between the program kickoff on May 1, 2016 and June 30, 2017, the 13 organizations in the LIFE & LEGACY cohort secured nearly \$5.3 million in legacy gift commitments. Together, the cohort organizations met the Year 1 community goal for legacy gifts, and are making progress toward the Year 2 goal.

Endowments are an increasingly important tool for Jewish organizations, helping them strengthen their financial security for supporting programs and services that the community values and depends upon. Endowments act as a foundation for the future—built by gifts from individuals and families, they grow and generate future income.

Seattle Jewish Community Endowment Fund

Endowments are the gift that keeps on giving to Jewish life. Individual, family, and organizational endowments managed by the Jewish Federation of Greater Seattle are a vital source of support for Jewish organizations and the services they provide to the community. In 2017, endowments under Federation stewardship generated nearly \$1.6 million of gifts for Jewish organizations and over \$1.4 million for other organizations.

Federation stewardship of endowments within the Seattle Jewish Community Endowment Fund offers value for Jewish philanthropists and organizations that are not available anywhere else. No other non-profit organization in the Puget Sound region has a greater understanding of Jewish organizations or charitable giving to programs in Israel. By investing in an endowment fund, individuals and families have a partner in both Jewish and secular philanthropy. In addition, the fund offers options that provide maximum tax and cost-effectiveness benefits. The Seattle Jewish Community Endowment Fund serves the philanthropic needs of families across generations, providing a means to ensure Jewish values are passed down.

The Seattle Jewish Community Endowment Fund currently has over \$58 million under management. Guidance is provided by the Federation Investment Committee, made up of financial, legal, and accounting professionals adhering to the highest standards of integrity, transparency, and best practices. The majority of funds are managed by SEI, an investment services firm that has over \$300 billion in assets under management globally. SEI ensures that investment assets align with Jewish values, are socially responsible, and are cognizant of human rights concerns.

How To Make a Legacy Gift to the Jewish Federation of Greater Seattle as a Part of Your Estate Planning:

Designate Federation as a Beneficiary:

- **Bequests**—Make a charitable bequest in your will, either a specific sum or a percentage of your estate.
- Life Insurance—Designate the Federation as a beneficiary of your life insurance policy.
- Charitable Annuities and Trusts—Generate income today and leave a legacy gift for the future.
- **IRAs, Other Retirement Plan Assets**—List the Federation as a full or partial beneficiary of your retirement plan assets.

• **Real Estate**—A gift of any type of real property (e.g. residence, condominium, or vacation home) is an easy way to make a big impact.

Establish an Endowment:

- **Donor Advised Fund**—Set aside tax-deductible dollars now and earn tax-free investment growth for future philan-thropy.
- **PACE/LOJE Funds**—Perpetual Annual Campaign Endowment Funds and Lion of Judah Endowment Funds allow you to support the Federation's work in perpetuity.
- Named Endowment Fund—Create a permanent legacy that perpetuates your ideals and name, or that of a loved one.

All of these giving vehicles and more are available to you for meeting your philanthropic and financial goals.


